CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The first thing I need to say as the new chairman for Ingatestone & Fryerning Parish Council is about the death of Chris Dale on 6th August 2011.

I had been his vice chairman for the last six years. Chris always worked very hard for the parish council. When he knew he would die from cancer, in my opinion, he put the parish council before his own health.

He often came to meetings when he felt very unwell and when most people I am sure would have stayed at home. Until the end he was driving things forward. One thing he wished to start was a Youth Council for Ingatestone and Fryerning. He wished to form a committee where young people between 11 and 18 could form into a group to add something to their community.

Phill Poston, (who is a fairly new parish councillor) but who a lot of people I am sure know from football at Seymour Field, has now taken this over and we will have our first meeting at 17.30 on Thursday 3rd November at Seymour Pavilion.

At Chris Dale's funeral his wife Christine asked that the congregation donate to a local charity, The Charles Cox Trust. This is a local charity to give local children a helping hand with money for their needs. A school trip that their family could not wholly afford or a helping hand with funding towards a musical instrument they could not afford.

The donations at the funeral raised £1300. I hope that I can live up to the standard that Chris set.

PLANNING COMMITTEE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING

Central Government are proposing changes to the planning rules which they believe will make obtaining Planning Permission a quicker and more efficient process. They want new rules to include a presumption in favour of permission being granted for sustainable developments.

This means that areas which are served by things such as good transport links, schools, shops, utility services and medical services etc. could be targeted. Ingatestone falls into this category.

The Government has indicated that under these new proposals the Green Belt will continue to be protected from inappropriate development as at present. Ingatestone is surrounded by the Metropolitan Green Belt with the residential envelope lying between the A12 to the West and the railway to the East. The Parish Council strongly believes that the Green Belt surrounding our village should be protected and will continue to resist moves to inappropriately develop it.

Some small areas inside the residential envelope are designated Green Belt or Protected Urban Open Spaces and since there is very little undeveloped non-Green belt and left inside the envelope these areas could be targeted for future development. Brentwood Borough Council has already identified such areas as potential areas for development.

The Government's Localism Bill aims to give local people new rights to shape the development of the communities in which they live. The Bill proposes a new type of community led initiative known as a Neighbourhood Plan. These plans will set out policies on the development and use of land in a parish or 'neighbourhood area' and give local people a much greater say on future developments.

Once such a plan is made and adopted it would become part of the Local Development Framework for that area. This means it will become a main consideration within the planning system. The Localism Bill also proposes that planning permission could be granted through a Neighbourhood Development Order. These will be able to grant planning permission for a specific location within the parish or neighbourhood area. The Parish Council are investigating what is involved in producing a Neighbourhood Plan for Ingatestone.

These initial investigations show that producing a plan is a complex undertaking and it is clear that producing one will be a lengthy and potentially expensive exercise requiring a team of people led by the Parish Council to be formed in a similar way to that which was done when the Village Design Statement was produced.

When the Localism Bill is finalised, further consideration will be given to this issue.

CHURCH & ENVIRONMENT COMITTEE
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This committee has 10 meetings a year on the 2nd Monday of each month starting at 19:30, the only months we miss are October and December. Ian Chatters, our grounds man, surprised us all with this summers planting. We had lots of comments both positive and negative. Once I had got over the surprise of broccoli and corn on the cob growing in the flower beds I found it interesting to see them growing and maturing. This summer Ian entered his work in both Ingatestone and Fryerning to be judged by BALI (British Association Landscape Industries).

He has just heard that he has received an award for his work and has also been short listed with 6 other people for the top prize.

Seymour Field

Seymour Field belongs to Brentwood Borough Council but we have always walked the whole area noting any problems with fencing and trees and always inform BBC. Our meeting in August is always held in the Pavilion which does belong to us and which we maintain.

Fryerning Cemetery

The cemetery is now using the new extension for burials.

In my last news letter I mentioned that we would be having bee hives in the cemetery. This will now not happen as the lady who requested the space has taken the hives to a field on a farm.

Seymour Pavilion

The £2,500 grant has now been spent. The new doors for Chips are in and all the refurbishment work to the toilets is now complete.

Fairfield

The erection of the second half of the games wall in the senior play area began on 12th September and was finished just over a week later.

We asked that the work was not started until the beginning of the new school year as the whole of the senior area is very popular and large parts of it would be out of action while the work took place. As soon as the metal fencing around the construction site was removed games were taking place. I would very much like to thank local groups (Ingatestone Rotary, Billericay Round Table) who donated money to help with this facility.

I attended the Essex Playing Fields AGM on Thursday evening 27th October and we were awarded 4 Certificates of Merit for the highest standards to the satisfaction of the Association. Two were Silver awards for the cricket club and Seymour field; the other two were for Fairfield for the play equipment and the maintenance of the field.

POLICY & RESOURCES COMMITTEE

When people first become councillors they are asked to join at least one and hopefully two committees. They also have to attend the once a month full council meeting.

The Policy and Resources committee has the largest number of councillors, usually 12 or 13 of the 15 members.

Their job is to form the budget for the year. They do this by asking each committee what they wish to do during the coming financial year and estimate how much this will cost. When each committee is happy with what they have asked for they submit it to Policy and Resources. It is Policy and Resources' job to then gather all committee's wish lists and see if the funds we will have in the following year will be enough for the outgoings. If there is not enough funds for the projects it is this committee's job to send it back to the relevant committee and ask them to decide which project they wish to drop.

This is obviously not an easy job for either committee, but to date we have always been able to reach an amicable agreement.

Policy and Resources' job is also to discuss any and all problems that concern the day to day running of the whole of the council. Office accommodation, furniture, office equipment and anything else that raises its head that does not belong to the other committees all come under their remit as well as staff.

It is at P&R meetings when, we have more time than Full Council, we can discuss for the first time and in depth the items that will appear on the Full Council's agenda. All discussions are carried out at this stage and hopefully a consensus agreed to propose at Full Council.

YOUTH COUNCIL

We are pleased to announce the formation of a Youth Council in the Village. This 'project' was the brainchild and passion of our 'late' Chairman Chris Dale.

Chris enjoyed the workings of the Parish Council in the Village and its interaction with everyone's lives. He wanted so much to give the Youth of the Village a voice and the means to get involved in a similar way.

The Youth Council meets on the first Thursday of every month at Seymour Pavilion from 6pm to 7pm. Everyone is welcome as there is always a 'Public Participation' section on the Agenda.

All the rules and regulations are on the Parish Council website, but in short: if you live in the Parish and are between 11 and 18 years old you're eligible.

There will be 12 Parish Youth Council 'seats', but with the Public Participation 'slot' anyone can have their say on just about anything they want.

We will need to 'elect' a Chair Person, a Treasurer ("Yes" – the Youth Council has funds), and a Secretary. 3 Seats have been designated to the Anglo-European, 3 to local Clubs and 6 to 'Youths' who live in the Parish, but don't come under the previous 2 categories.

At the meetings absolutely anything can be discussed, debated and voted on by the Youth Council. The Youth Council can request assistance from the Parish Council in case grants or funding is required or available and finally make things happen around the Village.

NEWS FROM THE COUNTY COUNCILLOR – HEALTH WATCH

The Government's Health and Wellbeing Board is going through the House of Lords at present. It will cover the NHS and Social Care - residential or in the community. One of its main themes is that the general public should have involvement in decision making and monitoring through democratically elected representatives.

Many of you already serve on similar groups and have relevant experience which would help you to be a member of Health Watch – perhaps as a school governor, or on a Parish Council or as a Member of an NHS Trust for an acute hospital, a mental health trust or a community trust. But you all have experience in your life of issues concerning health and social care for you, your family or neighbours.

There will be a national Health Watch organisation and then each County has been asked to set up a shadow organisation locally in 2012, which will be supported by local Health Watch in the districts – so there will be one in Brentwood by 2013.

There will be opportunities to visit NHS and Social Care establishments, to point out deficiencies and gaps in services and to make suggestions as to how improvements could be made. Training will be available plus support to the organisation. You will get to know how difficult decisions are made at a time when the financial situation is difficult.

Your community needs representation so please start to think about this now. Watch for details in the local press for Brentwood Health Watch. The views of someone locally are needed to represent your parish - could this be you?

NEWS FROM THE BOROUGH COUNCILLOR

Our member of parliament The Right Honorable Eric Pickles has announced proposals to give councils greater flexibility to reduce or remove council tax relief on second homes and empty homes. This measure is designed so that councils can use any money saved to keep overall council tax bills down and protect frontline services such as maintaining the weekly bin collection. Councils can already reduce the second homes discount to just 10% – this proposal gives councils the local discretion to charge the normal rate of council tax on second homes. Brentwood Borough Council will consider its position and make announcements in due course.

There are no plans to change the statutory council tax exemptions for homes left empty because a person has moved into a hospital or care home, has died, or has moved to provide care to another: these are special circumstances.

Also announced was a recommendation that would give local residents a new right to pay their council tax bills in 12 monthly payments, rather than 10 installments over a year. The 10 installment system is a historic quirk predating modern technology. This will make it easier for local taxpayers to manage their payments, especially those on fixed incomes like pensioners. Councils will also be encouraged to promote electronic billing and save councils' administrative costs this will also include the documents that need to be supplied with council tax bills. Local taxpayers would still have a right to receive hard copy documents on request.

INGATESTONE RAIL ASSOCIATION

It has now been announced that Dutch National Railways [Abellio Greater Anglia Ltd] will take over the running of our passenger services from National Express in February 2012. The franchise will be a relatively short one, ending in July 2014, although it is intended to issue a 15 year contract from this date onwards. We do not expect any significant changes initially, although the trains might gain a different logo and the lamp posts another coat of paint.

More positive news is that the new shelter by the Chelmsford platform has been installed providing additional cover for northbound travellers. This should be particularly welcome for students from the Anglo-European School. The Parish Council has supported this project for some time.

Concern continues to be expressed about the loss of waiting room facilities on the London bound platform. It is understood that National Express is examining possible alternatives, but the matter is becoming more urgent as the cold weather approaches.

We hope to develop a good relationship with the new operator in association with the Essex Rail Users Federation [ERUF] of which we are a member. We now have a half-hourly service during the day but we will continue to press for improvements to the early morning peak service. The evening restrictions for trains leaving Liverpool Street between 16.30 and 18.30 hrs are still in place despite our lobbying National Express. Hopefully, we might get some changes when Abellio takes over in February 2012.

NEW RAILWAY SHELTER

If you are a regular train user you will have noticed the new shelter in the parking area on the Chelmsford side of the track.

This has been erected by National Express and Essex County Council with half the money raised by students from the Anglo European School.

Almost six years ago two young girls from the Anglo came to a Full Council Meeting explaining why they wanted this shelter. At that time the need was due to the narrow platform on the Chelmsford side and shelter from the rain for a large group of people.

Since then the train schedule has changed and an express train now goes through Ingatestone just before the train to Chelmsford that the Anglo students use. The outcome of this is that the students are held back in the car park until this train has passed.

Although both of the original girls are now at university, one, Cristina Alonso-Mora was able to come back and perform the opening of the shelter which took place on 4th November. This shelter is now available for all train travellers to use as is the new gate to the platform by the shelter.

The Anglo European School has a group of Train Ambassadors who are trained by National Express and the British Transport Police in travel safety. These students are a support to the younger students when travelling on the train.

NETWORK RAIL – TUNNEL VISION?

Network Rail (NR) are obstructing Public Right Of Way 37 between Heybridge Road and Ingatestone Hall and refuse to install miniature stop lights that warn of approaching trains as advised in, “Office of Rail Regulation: A guide for designers, operators and managers - Railway Safety Publication no. 7, August, 2011”.

1846, railway built across the ancient public footpath on condition that the railway company keep the crossing in good repair.

14th July to 3rd August, 2011 - closure was granted by Essex County Council to NR under the “Road traffic regulation act 1984, section 14(2) temporary prohibition of pedestrian traffic” on condition the crossing be made even safer. For their “**safety**” walkers were directed to share narrow, blind-bend Hall Lane with motor vehicles travelling at 60 mph. NR didn’t do improvement works as promised and wire mesh obstructions attached to the kissing gates were not removed after the 21 days.

8th -29th September, 2011 - second closure. The fences, which had been rolled back around 6th/7th August to allow safe passage, presumably by public spirited people, were reinforced by two thick planks to obstruct the right of way.

29th September, 2011 - closure notice extended to 28th March, 2012.

November, 2011 NR ignore requests for safety criteria details stating it’s impossible to clear obstructions to vision, i.e. tree branches and decline to give details of their proposal for a tunnel alternative.

351 BUSES

Your complaints about the 351 bus service have been regularly arising at two to three per month, mainly because the bus failed to turn up. The replies from First Buses have at least now been more informative, but it remains so disappointing that the general reliability stays the same.

On the 8th November I attended the Essex County Council (ECC) Parish Transport Meeting. At that meeting First Buses reported that the number of breakdowns on the 351 service was mainly due to the newer replacement buses, which came from First Buses other regions; that were nevertheless found to be prone to failure. These buses are being replaced during the next month and First Buses are confident that this will give us a much more reliable service.

It therefore becomes even more important that we report bus problems to check and see if First Buses promise of replacing buses does improve reliability.

At this meeting I asked if First Buses has a meaningful system for checking bus reliability and do they take account of our complaints in their decisions to improve the service. I and was told that they have recently spent time surveying the 351 service and this, together with reviewing our complaints, has led to their decision to replace the buses on route 351.

Those of you who have followed my reports in the Newsletter will know that I keep pressing for a system that lets passengers know the actual time that a bus can be expected (real time information system). I was told that introducing this system has been agreed in principle by ECC and First Buses and the tendering process is underway. Watch this space, but don't hold your breath for having this information system available for anything but some way off for the 351 service.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Do you care about your community enough to keep it safe?

Many of you may not be aware that in the near future lighting in our side streets will be turned off from 1 to 5am and at the last police beat meeting I asked our PCSO Peter Kearney if the police, due to the changes, would the police be providing extra cover in Ingatestone and was told that due to cut backs it was unlikely. Therefore to prepare for the change I purpose that as a Parish we start our own neighbourhood watch, where each street has its own contact network. So in order to get started, I would like those people that have both time and commitment contact me and hopefully with enough volunteers we can discuss the best way forward to safeguard our village and work together as a community.

Without a volunteer for your road it will not work for you, therefore I suggest you ask the question how safe do I want my family and home to be, because this really is not the time to think Oh maybe I will join later, someone else will do it, this village has over 4,800 people, and half a dozen volunteers will not cover the entire village, so please think about what you want and why we need to keep this a nice and safe village.

FIX MY STREET

Winter is upon us, and sometimes it seems as if everywhere you look, there's potholes. "Why," you think, "hasn't the council filled those in?"

Well the first step to getting a pothole filled in for Essex County Council to know about it! Whilst the Highways Department do inspect every road in the county routinely, it takes them some time to get around them all, especially residential roads. They might be round once or twice a year, if that. You can either contact ECC on either 0845 603 7631/highwayenquirieswest@essex.gov.uk or www.essex.gov.uk/Travel-Highways/Report-ahighwayproblem/Pages/Default.aspx You will be issued with a reference number. If in you don't hear from them within 48 hours, we chase automatically and insist on reference number.

The Parish Council are on the case and both the pavement on Pine Drive (outside No: 24) and the various pot holes in New road are deemed to require repair and the details have now been passed onto the engineers.

However, it can be a pain to report problems to councils – knowing the correct council, the right phone number, which department – but modern technology has made things much easier. A government-funded website called ‘Fix My Street’ allows you to simply place a flag on a map, select the category of problem, and type a short report. To make the report clearer you can also upload photographs – and with many people being able to take photos on their phones, this is also much easier than it sounds.

It isn’t just potholes either – whether it is a broken street light, dog fouling, fly tipping, or graffiti, you can report it all in one place, and the system sorts out where to send your report.

One of the best features, however, is that all reports are displayed publicly – you can see if your neighbours have reported the problem already, and if so how long you’ve been waiting for the council to fix it, you can add your comments, or – in the unfortunate event of a pothole damaging your car – use the reports as evidence that Essex knew about the pothole and are liable.

Public Library Online is an online e-book subscription service which gives you themed digital bookshelves from a range of publishers. They offer the best fiction and non-fiction for adults and children. No complicated downloads, DRM or decisions on which device to buy, simply access the books using your existing computer or internet enabled mobile phone. You can use Public Library Online either from computers in the library, or from your own computer or mobile device any time any where. In the library you should connect directly – from your own equipment you will be asked to provide your library card number. As well as a good selection of themes for adults such as ‘Book Group’, ‘Autobiographies’ and ‘Paranormal Romance’ there are a good selection of children’s titles under such headings as ‘Adventure for 9-11s’, ‘Comedy for 8 – 12s’ and ‘children’s History’, ‘Magical Mischief’ and ‘Teen Fiction’.
