FAIRFIELD POND IS RENOVATED



Work has been completed on the extensive renovation of Fairfield Pond, thanks to generous grants received from **Essex County Council's CIF Award** and the **Essex Heritage Trust**.

During September, Anglia Land Drainage Ltd removed 95% of the silt from the pond, built a revetment to prevent the path from flooding and removed the extensive nettle beds and willow tree sprouts. The banks have also been smoothed out to make the whole area more accessible and easier to maintain. All this was undertaken whilst maintaining the fish stock on site with the clever use of a bund and at the time of the year when other species were at least risk from the works.



The final landscaping of the silt will take place in the Spring, once it has dried out and at that point, the safety fencing will be removed.

The Parish Council would like the pond to be an asset for the community and accessible for all. Grants have been

received to install new seating, picnic benches and bins, along with an information board for visitors outlining the history of the site.

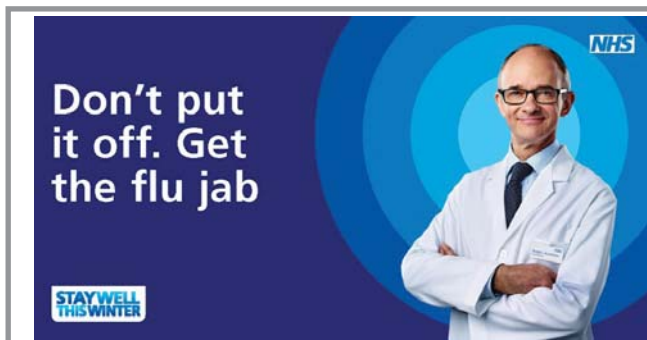

Over the summer the Parish Council launched its village questionnaire. Thanks to the many residents who took the time to complete the survey and return it to us. The findings can be found on the pages that follow. In spite of developing our website, it became clear that many residents felt unaware of what the Parish Council actually does and what its responsibilities are. We have discussed this in some detail and are looking at extending our use of social media in the hope that this may help publicise our meetings and activities.

Without doubt the largest project over the past six months has been the renewal and improvements to the pond at Fairfield Recreation Ground. The Parish Council was fortunate to obtain substantial grant

aid in order to improve the pond and the area surrounding it. Once the area has settled and grass has regrown, new seating will be installed. Hopefully this part of Fairfield will become an area for residents to enjoy and spend time relaxing.

Finally, I'd like to say thanks to Dave Whittaker who has recently resigned from the Parish Council. Personally I'd like to thank Dave for the advice he gave when the Churchyards & Environment Committee were first considering the "Pond Project". PARISH COUNCILLOR WANTED!

Ingatestone & Fryerning Parish Council are looking for a new Parish Councillor.

The role is varied, rewarding, challenging and frustrating and will give you an opportunity to become more greatly involved in the running of facilities and services within the Parish. As the first tier of local government, you will be joining over 80,000 local Councillors in a period of great change and devolution resulting in more power being passed into local hands.

As a councillor you have a responsibility to

- be well-informed, especially about diverse local views
- attend meetings when summoned to do so; the notice to attend a council meeting is, in law, a summons, because you have a duty to attend
- consider, in advance of the meeting, the agenda and any related documents which were sent to you with the summons
- take part in meetings and consider all the relevant facts and issues on matters which require a decision including the views of others ex-

- pressed at the meeting
- take part in voting and respect decisions made by the majority of those present and voting
- ensure, with other councillors, that the council is properly managed
- represent the whole electorate, and not just those who voted for you.

In order to become a Parish Councillor you must satisfy the following:

- Be registered as a local government elector for the parish OR
- during the whole twelve months preceding the date of co-option, occupied as owner or tenant, land or other premises in the parish OR
- that the principal or only place of work during those twelve months has been within the parish OR
- during the whole twelve months resided in the parish, or within three miles of it

PARISH OFFICES — WE HAVE MOVED



In the summer newsletter I let you know why the Parish Council had to move from 118, High Street, Ingatestone which had been our home for the last 10 years.

Shortly after the publication of the newsletter we found ourselves in a position where our preferred new premises would not be available to us by the end of our current lease. We were able to negotiate an extension to our existing lease with our landlord, who was very understanding and went out of her way to try to help us, but this was insufficient time to continue our negotiations on these premises.

A search took place immediately for a ground floor office, that was available within the timeframe, and was suitable for the Parish Council whilst giving easy access to our residents.

In the middle of August we started negotiations with the owner of 4 The Limes, Ingatestone to lease a ground floor office suite and terms were agreed by the middle of September at an Extraordinary Full Council Meeting. We vacated 118, High Street on the 28th September 2106 and moved in. Thanks to the cooperation of both the Agents and the landlord of the Limes we were able to negotiate and complete WITHIN 6 WEEKS.

The office is more than suitable for our staff who are already settling in however as it is only 325 sq. ft. Therefore only small meetings can be held there.

During our negotiations our Chair, Paul Jeater, and our Clerk, Abi Wood, entered into discussions with Essex County Council as to the possible use of Ingatestone library for our Parish Council meetings.

In collaboration with Essex County Council, who were extremely receptive to the idea, we are now able to use the library for our meetings which are held either during the daytime when the library is normally closed or in the evenings which in turn is making full use of the facilities.

We see this as a major step forward as the Parish Council has wanted to engage more with our residents; and by holding our meetings in the library we hope that it will encourage more public participation.

We look forward to seeing you in either our new office or at one of our meetings, you will be most welcome.

REPORT FROM THE CHURCHYARDS AND ENVIRONMENTS COMMITTEE



Since the July newsletter, myself and my fellow Parish Councillors on the C&E Committee have been busy working on a range of issues, including Fairfield pond, which I believe we can all agree, looks wonderful.

Following extensive surveys to the Lychgate, at Fryerning Cemetery, works are finally commencing. The works required a bat survey to be undertaken and now the Bat Conservation Society has confirmed that there is no bat presence.

The Parish Council had planned to hold another Litter Pick Day, however, due to a church event occurring on the pre-planned day, this has now been pushed back to early 2017. We will advertise this in due course and hope you will join us in keeping the village clean and tidy.

Collectively, we have taken concern over the Parish's environmental health. As such we have confirmed with our contractor, Greenscapes Ltd, that they do not use any environmentally damaging herbicides. In addition to this, we will be collating information collected by Brentwood Borough Council on the air quality of the Parish, and will be posting this upon the Parish Council's website on a quarterly basis.

I hope to continue to work towards Ingatestone' and Fryerning's good health and invite anyone with a concern to contact me personally, or attend our committee meetings (2nd Monday of each month)

NOTES FROM THE PLANNING COMMITTEE



The Planning Authority (Brentwood Borough Council) provides the Parish Council, who are a Statutory Consultee, with documents appropriate to any planning applications in our parish.

These documents can include detailed drawings and plans of the development to be carried out and could be for a new building or more commonly for an extension or addition to an already existing building.

Applicants are required to provide plans showing the development site, its curtilage and its relationship to other properties and roads and in particular, the relationship to adjacent neighbours who could be affected by the development should be clearly shown. Generally, plans showing elevations and floor plans, which are drawn to scale, are provided showing the current situation together with drawings of the proposed development. This enables these drawings to be placed side by side in order to clearly see the effect of the development on the existing building and area.

In the case of larger more complex developments a Design and Access statement is often provided by the applicant together with a Planning Statement which sets out the planning arguments in favour of the development. Other documents may include photographs of the site, details of boundary treatments and landscaping proposals.

The decision to either approve or refuse an application is made by Brentwood Borough Council based on Material Planning Considerations and on the views of a range of consultees such as Highways, Utility Companies, the Parish Council etc. The response sent to Brentwood Borough Council by the Parish Council is based on the planning merits of the application as measured against the BBC Local Plan (2006), and increasingly The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) produced by central government in 2012. A new Local Development Plan is due to supersede the 2006 Local Plan next year.

It is therefore important that decisions made by the Parish Council are based on Material Planning Considerations and do not conflict with the Local Plan or the NPPF.

Examples of just a few of these Planning Considerations are as follows:

- Is the application at variance with the Local Plan or the NPPF?
- Does it have a detrimental impact on the

street scene?

- Is it in a Conservation Area?
- Does it represent overdevelopment of the site?
- Is it in the Green belt?
- Will it affect the privacy of the neighbours and cause overlooking?
- Will it result in traffic hazards or road safety issue?

A few examples of things that are not Planning Considerations are:

- The identity of the applicant
- De-valuation of adjoining properties
- The number of objectors
- Boundary disputes
- Disruption during construction

The Parish Council's Planning Committee meets at 9.30am every two weeks on a Thursday in the Library and welcomes residents who wish to attend to discuss planning applications they may be affected by.

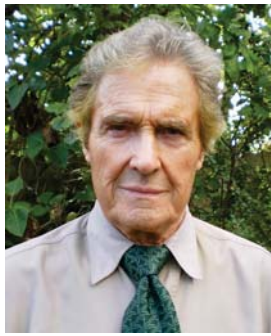

351 BUS SERVICE

How have you found the 351 bus service? The last complaint copied to the Parish Office was at the end of August. Over the past few weeks I have found this service reasonably good, with the only delays caused by traffic problems and outside First



Buses control. However, please copy the Parish Office with any complaint, as without them I can only rely on my own use of the buses in accessing their performance.

We have agreed to an Essex County Council (ECC) proposal to have information boards situated at the two bus stops at the Market Place. I will be tasked, on behalf of the Parish Council, with selecting travel information for this board, and will include notice of time table changes, information updates, etc. Once they have been running I would welcome any suggestions passed to the Parish Office.

I recently attended the ECC Parish Representatives Bus Passenger Transport meeting with First Essex Buses and ECC staff. ECC do not seem totally keen to real time information system (RTIS) at bus stops, and if they do eventually provide this information it will only be at stops which have a display notice board; none of which are in Ingatestone. We are trying to persuade ECC to install these displays at our Market Place stops, but face the financial constraints within ECC. The only (and best) RTIS information is from the First Buses App, the details of which I covered in our last Newsletter. I have used it to check, before leaving home, the expected arrival of the next 351 bus, and have found it very good. But you need a suitable mobile phone!

About five to six times a year I use the X30 express bus from Chelmsford to Stansted Airport. Until recently this has been a most reliable service, but not so recently as for my last two trips I had to get a taxi. So make sure you have £45.00 plus for your taxi fare when you next use the X30 service. A particularly unacceptable feature I came across at the Chelmsford Bus Station was the bus times display. I had always understood that the time given in minutes for the next bus was real time, but not so as it is no different than the other (e.g 12.30) timetable display. So be warned and give yourselves plenty of time and notes in your wallet.

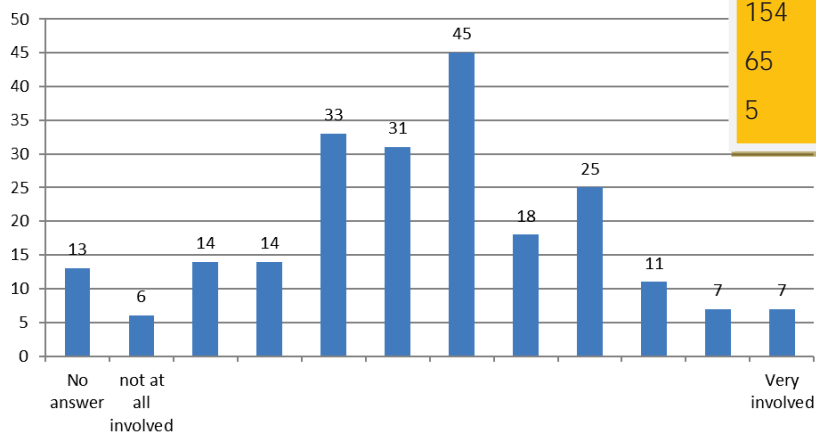


PARISH QUESTIONNAIRE

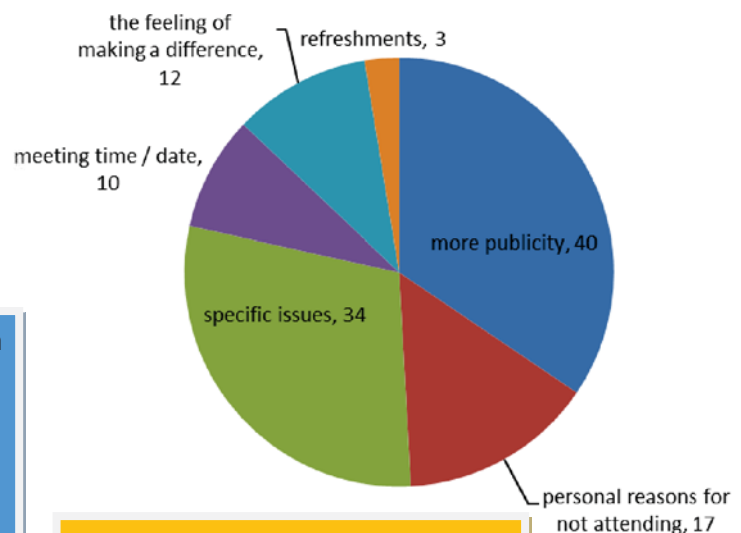

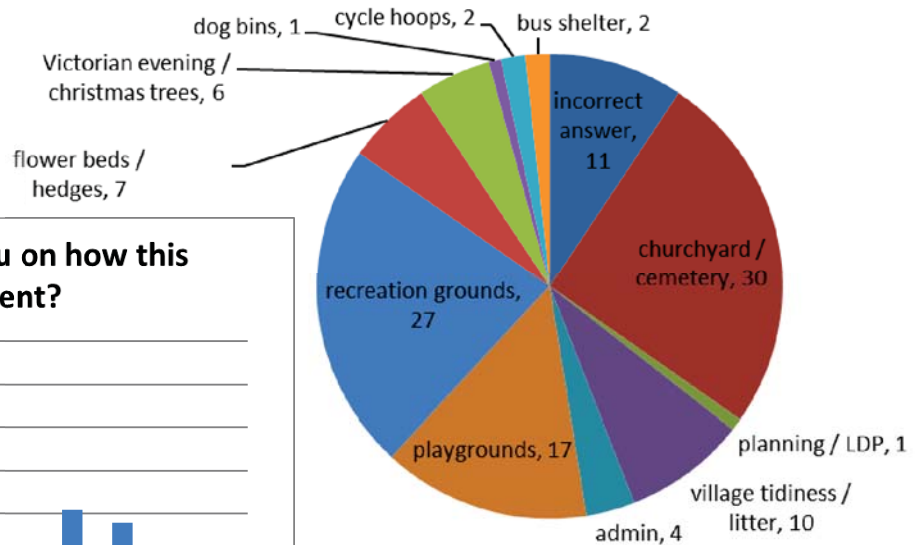

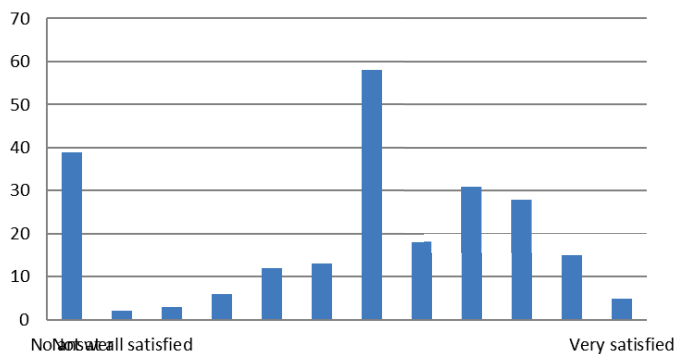
Do you know what the Precept is spent on?

How satisfied are you on how this money is spent?



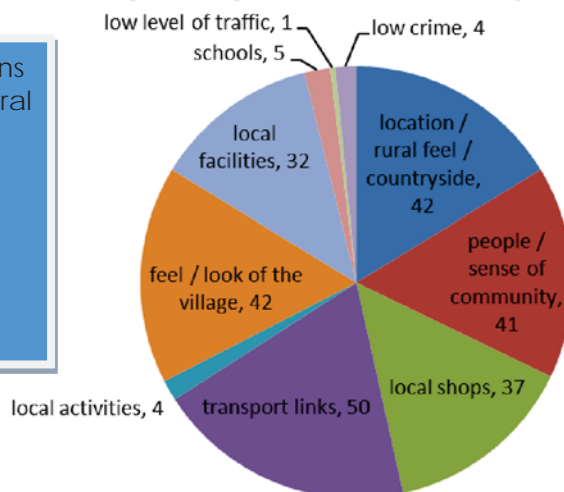

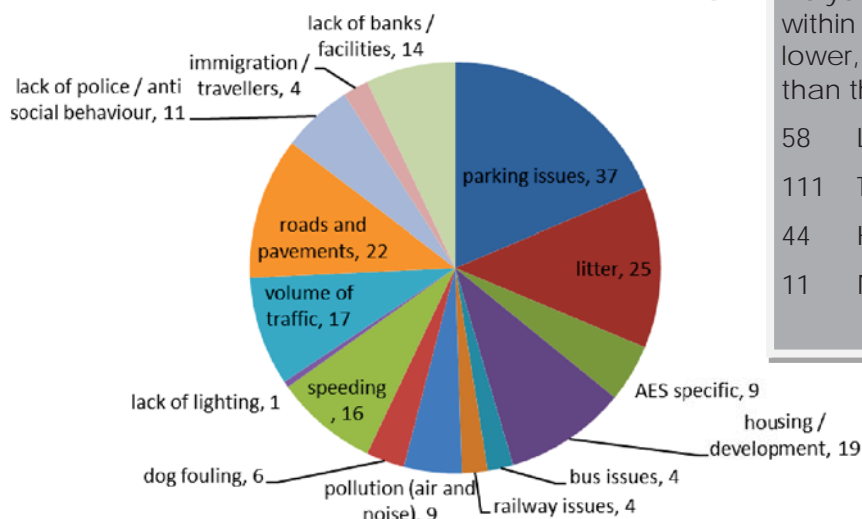
Do you have any concerns about the litter and general tidiness of the villages?

What do you feel are the 3 worst things about living in Ingatestone and Fryerning?



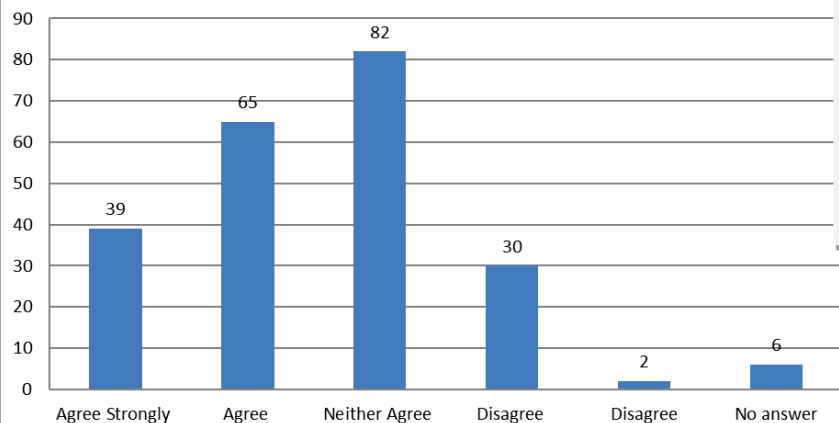
Do you feel that crime levels within the community are lower, the same or higher than the rest of the Borough?

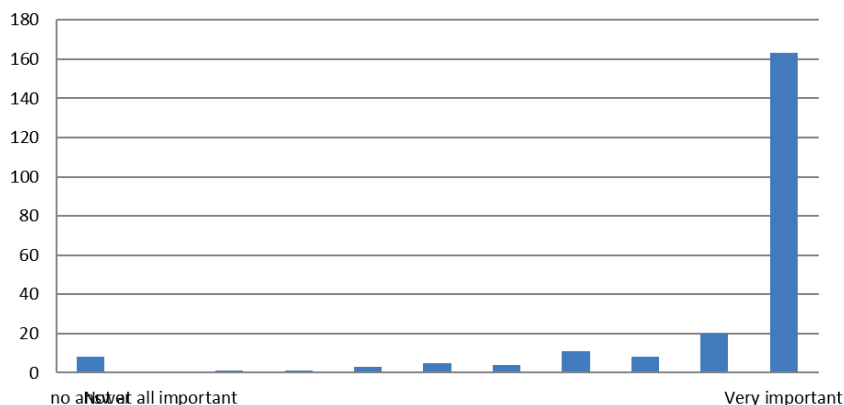

THE NEW FOLLY SURGERY PATIENT REFERENCE GROUP HEALTH INFORMATION EVENING ON CANCER DETECTION

Ingatestone Library High Street, Ingatestone. CM4 9EU Wednesday 22nd February 2017 6:30 to 8:30 pm

Patients of the Ingatestone Doctors' Surgery responded very positively when asked if they would welcome more information on specific health issues. Top of their list was an expressed desire to know more about cancer detection.

With all that in mind, the members of The New Folly Surgery Patient Reference Group, which is registered with Basildon and Brentwood Clinical Commissioning Group (BBCCG) decided to provide an opportunity for anyone who is interested to find out more about this subject. We are only too aware that this is an issue which is increasingly commonplace but nevertheless highly sensitive. We are very pleased that Dr Gytha Clear Hill, Macmillan GP (covering the BBCCG area) has already indicated that she is happy to attend and will also bring a colleague. They will explain what is needed for people to identify possible signs of a condition and to answer any questions on this subject. One of our local Ingatestone GPs will also attend.

We hope that this will be just the first of a series of such meetings and trust that it will go some way to help people to deal with a possible condition which could be of great concern to them or those close to them.

All the details for this event will be posted on the website of Ingatestone & Fryerning Parish Council, and we will publish another reminder article in The Journal that is local to the village, early in the New Year.

We sincerely trust that, as these meetings continue, they will be a real benefit to as many members of our community as possible.

She had an incredible story to tell and proved to be an inspiration to everyone, especially the way she tackled and overcame the challenges that life through at her.

We have now elected our new School Council members and they have already been busy organising events to support various charities. This year they have taken the decision to nominate St Francis Hospice and the Dogs Trust. They also helped to host our MacMillan Coffee Morning which was a huge success. I would like to thank everyone who came along to support the event, helped to set up and provided cakes. The children had a great time serving, helping out to run games and organising the event with Mrs Thomas. The final amount that we raised was £615.79 which is an incredible amount to have collected in a couple of hours.

Our school PTA has also been extremely active raising additional funds for the school. Last year they purchased a mini bus for the school which we use on a regular basis to transport children to sporting events and other activities.
