SEYMOUR FIELD PAVILION OPEN AND READY FOR COMMUNITY USE

Ingatestone and Fryerning Parish Council (IFPC) is delighted to announce that the newly renovated Seymour Field pavilion is officially open and ready for use by our community. The grand opening held on 29 May was a great success and was attended by those that made the new community facility possible.

Around 50 guests attended the event which included a football competition for four to eight year olds from Stones Athletic Youth Football Club. Our guests certainly made the most of the afternoon tea and ice cream. We would also like to thank the M7 band who provided us with some great jazz entertainment throughout.



The launch followed two years of negotiation and many hours spent by the parish councillors and staff to secure a lease to protect the best interests of the parish. The parish council recognised the importance of refurbishing the pavilion at Seymour Field and keeping the land a green, recreational space for our future generations.

The refurbishment includes reconfiguration of the pavilion to provide two changing rooms, an official's changing room, community hall, kitchen, toilets and storage space. Modernisation of the site was essential to meet FA criteria and allow Seymour Field to function as a community football venue.

The two main football teams in the village, Stones Athletic YFC and Stones FC, worked alongside the Essex County FA to address potential areas of growth. It is anticipated the pavilion will support an additional six teams playing football at the site

over the next five years. This will in turn support over 70 new players, of whom 30 will be competing in girls' teams.

Paul Jeater, chair of IFPC says: "Prior to the parish council signing a 25-year lease for Seymour Pavilion and field, the site was in poor repair. Now, thanks to receiving our grants and the parishioners, we have been able to create a facility that will be the pride of the parish for future generations."

We want to give the chance to members of the public to come and view the new fantastic facility. A date has yet to be agreed but we hope to allow the public the chance to look round before we become available for bookings.

Lyndon Day (43 years of service)

IFPC PRESENTS PLAQUE TO INGATESTONE STATION TO CELEBRATE 175 YEARS

Our villages came together for an inspiring event on 12 May to celebrate 175 years of Ingatestone railway station.

The station opened in 1844, when Lord William Petre, allowed the Eastern Counties Railway to run through his land. He insisted that the station design mirrored Ingatestone Hall. His descendant Lord Petre, who frequently uses the station, took part in the celebrations and cut the train design cake.

Some of our local celebrities attended the event, including Olympic gold medallist Fatima Whitbread, former England cricketer Graham Gooch, The Right Reverend Stephen Cottrell, Bishop of Chelmsford and The Mayor of Brentwood, Sheila Murphy.

An excellent exhibition about the station's history was prepared by the station's adopter, Robert Fletcher.

Students from the Anglo European school provided musical entertainment.

David Abrey, a long-standing member of Ingatestone and Fryerning Parish council, now retired from council duties, unveiled a commemorative plaque from the parish council.

Paul Jeater, chair of Ingatestone and Fryerning Parish Council says: "Ingatestone and Fryerning Parish Council is honoured to be a part of the station's 175th anniversary celebrations and have unveiled a new plaque that will hang in the main ticket hall. We are proud of our station's heritage and would like to thank the hardworking station staff for their invaluable service to our community."

Last year around 780,000 passenger journeys were made to and from Ingatestone station.

PLANNING

PLANNING COMMITTEE

The Planning Committee continues to meet fortnightly (Thursday mornings 9.30 at Ingatestone Library) to discuss all planning and listed building applications within the parish.

As a statutory consultee, the parish council reviews and discusses the applications and puts forward an 'objection or 'no objection'



to Brentwood Borough Council. This is based on the material planning consideration and it is Brentwood Borough Council who ultimately make the decision.

The committee consists of five parish councillors who meet to discuss planning and listed building applications within Ingatestone & Fryerning.

In recent months the planning committee has seen a change in it's membership. David Abrey and Lyndon Day who have served on the planning committee for many years have retired in this election cycle. We would like to thank them for all their hard work over the years and extensive expertise. Looking to the future we are delighted to welcome new councillors Caroline Russell and Darryl Sankey to the committee and wish them all the luck in their new role. If you are considering making changes to your property, the government's planning portal website provides an interactive guide which is a useful starting point when considering potential building works (www.planningportal.gov.uk).



COMMITTEE UPDATES



COMMUNICATIONS & IT

The Communications and IT Committee is in the process of discussing the introduction of free village Wi-Fi to Ingatestone High Street.

It came to light in our recent local business survey, taken by our Neighbourhood Plan team, that businesses were affected by poor coverage. We are currently in negotiations with our trusted IT supplier to find out how we can best provide a Wi-Fi service, which will enable users to make calls via Wi-Fi or Whatsapp, bridge the gap and go online where we have poor Wi-Fi connection.

The new system, which will be safe, secure and GDPR compliant, will provide free, unlimited internet access to the general public.



It will help local businesses meet their regulatory requirements, provide the parish council with statistics on how people interact with village amenities and help enhance crime detection.

Eight WatchGuard WiFi access points will provide coverage area of the High Street. These are the same type of access point used currently by the parish council offices. These access points provide maximum data transfer to compatible devices, as well as supporting all previous generations of WiFi.

Members of the public will be able to connect to a public Wi-Fi signal and will then be directed to a web page. They will be prompted to log in either via a web form or social media, to meet the EU data privacy rules.



NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE (NPAC)

As reported in our last newsletter, 71 per cent of the villages' businesses who responded about 'infrastructure challenges' in our Business Questionnaire were most concerned about mobile phone coverage.

The parish council believes that the provision of good telecommunications is an important aspect of sustainable economic growth and has been in touch with the main four mobile phone providers that cover our parish. The good news is that Vodafone have responded and made alterations to their antennae to improve the signal.

Vodafone has been the most pro-active of the four, and welcomed our comments on coverage. Their network team has looked at the mast serving the village and made some changes to optimise coverage in the local area. We will be asking our businesses on whether this has resulted in better service.



Vodafone has also suggested we work in partnership with them to bring down the costs of network roll out so any outstanding gaps can be closed. We will be doing this.

COMMITTEE UPDATES



CHURCHYARD & ENVIRONMENT

In recent months we have worked on the grounds maintenance contract that was scheduled for renewal.

The correct tendering process was followed. A shortlist of applicants to interview was drawn up by the chairs of the parish council and the Churchyards and Environments committee and the parish clerk, who conducted the interviews.

As a result, our recommendation, later supported by the parish council, was to award the contract for the next three years to JPB Landscapes. Obviously, the decision to change our contractor was not one to be taken lightly, but councillors have a duty to obtain best value for money for parishioners.

We would like to thank IDC Greenscapes for their work over the past years.



POLICY & RESOURCES

The main role of the committee is to supervise the operational and financial planning activities of the council as a whole.

Over the past few months, as with all committees, the Policy and Resources Committee has seen some changes in members who we look forward to working with. We have welcomed Martyn Hart and Darryl Sankey to the committee since the election in May.

The committee has been working hard to establish new policy for Seymour Field. The council plan to have Seymour Field pavilion available to hire from 1 July and hiring costs and plans for the running of the pavilion will be disclosed in due course.

Our next meeting will be held on Monday, 22 July (7.30pm) at Ingatestone Library, High Street Ingatestone CM4 0BA. As always the meeting is open to members of the public and the press to attend.



PERSONNEL

Now that the Seymour Field and pavilion has been leased from Brentwood Borough Council for the next 25 years, with generous grant funding, and brought up to Football Association (FA) standards, we are looking for a caretaker to help look after the facility.

The parish council intends to recruit a part-time parish caretaker to look after the pavilion and field and provide general maintenance work around the parish itself. We are hoping to attract a local person to provide a cleaning and caretaking service, ensuring the building is maintained to a high standard and effecting minor repairs where necessary. The duties will also extend to other open spaces in the parish managed by the parish council.

Pavilion improvements include changing rooms with separate entrances, a meeting room for up to 40 people and a renovated kitchen. It will be available for hire from the parish council office from July.





COMMUNITY NOTICEBOARD

INGATESTONE LIBRARY NEWS

After a successful community meeting to discuss the future of our library, IFPC has applied to register the library as an Asset of Community Value. By taking this important step, the parish council is in a position to formulate a plan if the opportunity arises.

The consultation by Essex County Council on future library services ran from 29 November



2018 to 21 February 2019. ECC is currently analysing feedback and reports are expected this summer. ECC received 19,230 responses.

In the meantime, the parish council invites members of the public to share ideas and views on our special Facebook page - search for 'Ingatestone & Fryerning Parish Council library discussion'.

HEARING INFORMATION SESSIONS

Another successful hearing information session was held in the Library on the 27 April, with 20 people taking leaflets and 10 having hearing tests. They discussed their options with audiology nurse Helen Perry and Todorina Hammond, our local manager from the charity Action on Hearing Loss.

The sessions are free and available for walk-ins on the advertised days of the event.

Cllr Martyn Hart says: "The Library provides an ideal location to run these sessions - it's a friendly relaxed environment where we can take time for people to learn about the support they're entitled to, what equipment can help, ways to tackle tinnitus and tips from users and professionals in the field."

Sessions are held in our library.

IFPC RESTORES BEGGAR HILL PHONE BOX

The parish council recently funded the restoration project for the Beggar Hill phone box. This included a complete clear out, repairs and restoration which has returned it to former glory.

We would like to thank Cllrs Russell, Hart and Blunsten for completing the project. Cllr Hart says: "The real hard work was carried out by Caroline Russell along with her daughter Liz and Toby Blunsten. I am happy to see that instead of a derelict phone box, it is now a bright landmark. We hope to populate the phone box with information leaflets for our popular walking routes through the parish. Thank you for all your hard work on the renovation."

SUPPORT THE CHARLES COX TRUST

The Charles Cox trust is a registered charity which was established in 1992 by the parish council in memory of Charles Cox, a long serving member of the council. He was involved with many young people's clubs and organisations as well as being a hard working member of the community. That's why the parish council, at the time of his death, wanted to mark his efforts in some way and set up a trust to honour all his work for the parish.

It was set up to help young people who live in the parishes of Ingatestone and Fryerning with any projects which can improve the social or educational welfare of the individual youngsters, such as help towards the purchase of computer or sports equipment.

Local schools and some of the children's clubs have benefitted from the trust. Young people or their parents can also apply for help with any other special purchase to help the child. We are a self-funding trust and are always pleased to receive contributions to trust funds. The trustees meet twice a year, when all applications are considered.

INGATESTONE EASTER EGG HUNT LAUNCHES

Children up to 11 years old had to identify the coloured egg in a poster in each shop's window on a special entry form for a chance to win a prize. Excellent chocolate Easter prizes were donated by Abigail's Lifestyle and Budgens for three winners.

After 106 correctly entered forms were counted the winners were drawn at random. Lexi, Ava and Lily were the lucky ones whose entry forms were drawn, they were very pleased as were all businesses and participants by the successful and enjoyable hunt.

As a direct result of the positive feedback from the Easter egg hunt, early discussions have taken place about staging a summer themed event which is exciting news for our villages.

WHAT DOES THE INGATESTONE AND FRYERNING NURSING TRUST DO?

Prior to the formation of the NHS in 1948 health provision was provided by local nursing associations. The organisers were responsible for employing district nurses, paying their salaries and providing them with housing and equipment. The local district nurse for Ingatestone and Fryerning lived in Sidgwick Cottage on Fryerning Lane.

However, after much deliberation Essex County Council and the Charity Commission approved the formation of a trust to be known as the Ingatestone and Fryerning Nursing Trust in 1951. The trust still exists today.

The Nursing Trust aims to offer financial help to residents of any age during times of illness, injury, infirmity or disability. Help is not long term but could be used for the cost of extra heating, home help services, transport costs or emergency alarms. It can also be used for one-off expenditure on mobility and daily living aids.
