

#### LETTER FROM THE CHAIR

Welcome to the autumn edition of our parish council newsletter.

Since the last edition we have co-opted two new members onto the parish council, I'd like to welcome Caroline Baker and Roy Pittman. I look forward to working with them and hope they will enjoy being parish councillors.

I'd also like to extend an official welcome to our parish caretaker, Alan Wright. Alan's appointment started in July and while most of his time is spent at Seymour Field, he will also be carrying out other duties around the parish.

At Seymour Field, the pavilion is now available for hire by local organisations. It has already been booked by local political parties and last month the Ingatestone Allotment Association held it's AGM there.

During August, the clerk and I met with representatives of Brentwood Borough Council to

discuss the possibility of installing CCTV in the High Street. At the time of writing, research and talks are still taking place.

Once financial implications are fully known and a decision has been made, we will report back to residents.

Additionally, this year the tradition of installing christmas trees along the High Street continues into a 22nd year. We have increased the quantity of trees to 53, an additional ten more than the previous year. The trees will be installed in the last week of November. We

always recieve great feedback on how great the trees look lighting up the High Street and we are delighted to continue this for another year.

After last year's return the best dressed window competition returns to IFPC. It was great to host the competition again last year and know it will be hotly contested again, so get planning your displays.

#### A MUSEUM FOR INGATESTONE



Two years ago, Paul Jeater raised the idea of an Ingatestone Museum at a parish council meeting. At the time the council supported the idea in principle, but it was agreed to park the idea as the council were fully occupied trying to negotiate the lease for Seymour Field and pavilion with Brentwood Borough Council.

In the summer of 2018, when Greater Anglia were negotiating to extend the franchise to run the train service across East Anglia, we learned that one of the conditions was that Greater Anglia would support a number of community projects across the region.

There has been ongoing concern about the deteriorating state of the signalman's cottage on Station Lane. In August 2018, an initial site visit was agreed with representatives of Greater Anglia, the Railway Heritage Society and the parish council where the possibility of using the site for a museum was raised.

Local resident, David Bateman, has acted as negotiator between the various bodies concerned, but before Greater Anglia would commit to the project one major problem had to be overcome.

As many residents will be aware, whenever it rained the section of Station Lane close to the station car park entrance and the cottage flooded and the resulting spray from cars has caused further damage to the adjacent cottage wall. Only tackling the drainage issues in that section of Station Lane would resolve the problem.

Through the intervention of our county councillor, Lesley Wagland, Essex County Council agreed to tackle the problem and give it sufficient priority that Greater Anglia would maintain their interest in the project. The drainage repairs were carried out in

August and based on the heavy rain at the start of October, the problem of standing water seems to have been eradicated.

Specifications are now being drawn up for the external building work so that the cottage can be restored to its former glory alongside the other station buildings. Discussions are now underway to establish a charitable trust to administer the project. It is likely that building work will commence in Spring 2020. Once completed we will be looking at restoring the three internal rooms.

All this needs to be completed before discussions can take place as to what the museum should contain. At this stage we will hold a meeting to get parishioners' ideas and, of course, publish updates on our website, social media pages and this newsletter.

#### WELCOME TO OUR NEW PARISH COUNCIL CARETAKER

Some of you will have seen Alan Wright keeping an eye on IFPC's assets.

His main role since the end of July has been preparing the new Seymour Pavilion to serve our community and the football teams in particular.

He ensures the pavilion is kept clean and tidy for those renting it for their meetings and events and keeps the building in a good state of repair. He also ensures the fields are clear of litter.



Alan has noticed the benches around the parish need refurbishing and the noticeboard at Fryerning and the village signs need sprucing up. He has undertaken further health and safety training so that he can inspect our playgrounds weekly.

Alan is already proving an invaluable member of the parish council staff team.

#### **NEWS ON OUR NEW SEYMOUR PAVILION**

Ingatestone and Fryerning Parish Council has established a committee to oversee the running of our new facility - the Seymour Pavilion and Field Committee.

The committee last met on 28 August 2019 and discussed further improvements to be made to the pavilion, including the installation of additional CCTV, a defibrillator and future Wi-Fi, if required.

#### Pitch maintenance contract awarded

The clerk updated the committee on the recent tendering process for the pitch maintenance contract and advised that only one application had been received after advertising on social media and the Contracts Finder website. This was from JPB Landscapes - our current grounds maintenance contractor.

As a result, JPB Landscapes have been awarded a 3-year contract from 1 September and an agreement has been added to the existing main grounds maintenance contract.

Work includes applying a complete top dressing, fertiliser and grass seed to the pitches every year. High standards for pitch maintenance are set out by the Football Association.

#### **ESSEX LIBRARIES TO REMAIN OPEN FOR FIVE YEARS**



Between November 2018 and February 2019, Essex County Council (ECC) held a 12-week consultation to ask the public their views on the future of our libraries.

This followed the announcement last year that they had evaluated Ingatestone Library's services as 'tier 3'. This meant that a future library could be 'run by the community or other partners with ECC support'.

IFPC took action by holding a public meeting at the Community Centre on 31 January, where we heard the views of around 100 residents. We also set up a Facebook group for discussion.

IFPC felt it appropriate to register the library as a community asset and 'expressed an interest' in running a community library to help protect our library from closure.

After receiving around 19,230 consultation results, ECC announced its future strategy. This outlined their plans for libraries and their intention to work with partners to set up community libraries (seen in full at: libraries.essex.gov. uk/libraries-consultation/essex-future-library-services-strategy-2019-2024). They pledged that libraries would stay open for the next five years.

At IFPC's full council meeting on Thursday 5 September, a majority of parish councillors voted to maintain this expression of interest. Since then, the IFPC clerk has received a call about community-run libraries from the Essex Libraries Community Library Services Team, who have said they will provide an information pack by the end of October 2019.

# IFPC INSTALL TWO BRAND NEW DEFIBRILLATORS

At the beggining of August, our two new community defibrillators were installed in the parish providing additional access to life saving equipment.

IFPC have worked in partnership with SADS UK to provide two new defibrillators in the parish. The equipment is located outside of the Fryerning Parish Rooms and the catholic church. This work follows the prexisting device which is located outside of the Co-Op in the High Street, to be able to have three devices allows all residents of the parish to only ever be a couple of minutes away from access to a machine.

In September, we were also delighted to host our first defibrillator training session held at the parish rooms. Local residents attended the session and learnt a valuable skill in how to peform CPR as well as how to operate a defibrillator. We would like to thank MediTrain and our instructor David Frankton who provided a informative session on the day which attendees greatly appreciated. The training session recieved local press recognition as an article featured in the Brentwood Gazette the following week.



#### **COMMITTEE UPDATES**

#### YOUR NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN IS ON ITS WAY



After nearly two years of evidence gathering and analysis, we have commissioned a town planning consultancy (DAC Planning) to assist us in putting a draft together before Christmas. This consultancy has taken plans in other parishes and towns in Essex through the entire process and will ensure that contents comply with the expectations of the law.

The neighbourhood plan makes an assessment of our physical assets, setting out what should be protected and where future development should go. The main themes cover economic development, lifestyle and well-being, housing, connectivity (getting around) and the environment. Each theme leads to written policies detailing objectives against which plans will be implemented through the statutory planning process.

We have been reporting progress regularly in each newsletter, on the parish council website and social media channels and local businesses, residents and community organisations have responded to some initial ideas.

#### Why has IFPC been producing a neighbourhood plan?

In 2011 The Localism Act was passed. This enabled parishes to become a formal part of the statutory planning process if it produced a neighbourhood plan that met the legal standards.

A neighbourhood plan is a community-led planning framework for guiding the future development, regeneration and conservation of an area.

IFPC decided that Ingatestone and Fryerning deserved to be protected in this way, and set about producing one.

#### What happens next?

The plan will be made available in hard copy and on our website for a consultation period of six weeks. The publicity will include details of where and when the plan can be viewed and how to make comments and by what date.

The Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee will then review the response and revise the plan as necessary.

The revised neighbourhood plan will be presented to the Statutory Planning Authority (BBC) who will appoint an independent examiner to look at whether the plan meets the basic conditions of compliance with the National Planning Policy Framework, e.g. contributing to the achievement of sustainable development, general conformity with the strategic policies in the development plan for the local area and compatibility with EU obligations.

#### Your time to vote

The final stage in creating a neighbourhood plan is to hold a referendum run by the Electoral Office at Brentwood. For the plan to come into force, there must be a majority 'yes' vote.

We are hoping that this will be at the same time as the Borough Council election in May 2020 to encourage as many residents as possible to cast a vote and to reduce the cost of conducting an election.



## **COMMUNICATIONS & IT**

When the Communications and IT Committee met on 25 June 2019, we elected a chair (Dawn Jelley) and vice chair (Emma Benson). We also agreed on the membership of our WhatsApp sub committee, which works on our Facebook and Twitter social media channels.

During the meeting, Rory Skepelhorn, our business apprentice, explained that he is undertaking a project which involves marketing and advertising Seymour Pavilion on the IFPC website. We look forward to seeing the final results at www.ingatestone-fryerningpc.gov.uk.

We also reviewed our Communications Policy and a future cultural trail smartphone app.

The autumn meeting took place on Monday 21 October, where it was decided that we should begin to meet on a bimonthly basis. During a busy meeting, we set up a task and finish group, which will specifically look at supporting our office IT. We also discussed the design of our Neighbourhood Plan, which should be completed in November.

The next meeting will take place in January.



#### **COMMITTEE UPDATES**



#### **PLANNING COMMITTEE**

The Planning Committee continues to meet in Ingatestone Library on Thursdays, every fortnight from 9.30am (finishing around 11am).

There is the usual amount of home extensions and tree works to be discussed at each meeting, but we've noticed an increase in enforcement action from Brentwood Borough Council lately.

There are a great many things home and property owners are allowed to do, both to the buildings and the land. They do (after all) own it. But there are a good number of small works that require some form of application to be made to the local council, (in the case of our parish, that is Brentwood Borough Council).

It really does help to be 100 per cent sure if any 'work' you might be doing does, or does not require an application. Should you ever wish to sell your property, any prospective buyer's solicitor would most certainly wish to see any relevant council paperwork for any alterations and small works (as well as the more obvious extension of loft conversion) building works.



It's (unfortunately) now impossible to have an informal 'chat' with the planning department at Brentwood. It is possible to book and pay for a meeting to discuss proposed works.


#### **DRAFTING HOUSING POLICIES**

In the Local Development Plan (LDP) prepared by Brentwood Borough Council, that could become the statutory planning instrument next spring, a site for some 57 housing units has been identified close to the slip road from the A12.

In anticipation that this land will no longer be designated as 'green belt' if the LDP is agreed, the owner of the land and a property developer have begun to sketch out some ideas.

There is no doubt from the evidence gathered by the Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee, that our parish is in need of affordable homes and smaller homes for some of our older residents to consider for 'downsizing'.

Our neighbourhood plan housing policy suggests that we approve the borough-wide affordable housing requirement of 35 per cent for all proposals of 11 or more (net) units and that the design, style and density of new housing are in keeping with the character of the parish and the rural environment, that it is sustainable, free from flood risk and includes adequate parking provision and appropriate landscaping.



We have had an initial discussion with the prospective developer to ensure they take account of our residents' views, and this is the time to exert our influence.

# WAR GRAVE SIGN AT FRYERNING CEMETERY

Six war graves have been identified at Fryerning cemetery. The Commonwealth War Graves Commision (CWGC) recently presented the church with a sign to honour this. The commission maintains more than 165,000 war graves at over 12,000 locations in the UK.



The CWGC are currently running a new project called 'Eyes On, Hands On'. This project will look to coordinate volunteers from around the region to be the eyes of the CWGC on scattered graves. The work volunteers would undertake includes providing accurate information about headstone condition along with some light-touch cleaning and tidying to augment the regular maintenance cycles conducted by permanent members of staff.

The CWGC hope that volunteers will want to find out more about the servicemen and women whose names are carved on the headstone, researching in the local community and online sharing interesting stories with the community and wider audiences.

Rory Skepelhorn says: "This year has flown by and as an office we have been very busy, so I have had lots of responsibilities and work to be getting stuck into. My coursework is nearing completion as I am expected to do my final examinations in December. I have learnt so much over the past year and have a passion for local governance. I have also used my acquired skills to set up my own social media consultancy business for local councils helping them with their pages, I have Ingatestone and Fryerning Parish Council to thank."



### **POLICY & RESOURCES**

Earlier this year the parish council made the decision to initiate a grants policy and put a limited amount in the budget so that local organisations could apply in order to facilitate activities for the local community.

At September's meeting we awarded our first grant, the beneficiaries are Ingatestone Rotary Club. The grant is to assist with the Christmas Fayre they are planning on 8 December at the Community Club.

A couple of years ago the parish council was awarded Foundation Level in the Local Council's Award Scheme by the National Association of Local Councils. Since then we have put in place a number of initiatives and improvements and now we are ready to apply for Quality Level status. Our progress has been possible because of the effort and dedication of our staff and hopefully we will be successful and will be able to report this in our next edition.

An easy way to check a bus stop timetable is to see if it has a bus after 8pm from Chelmsford or after 9pm from Brentwood. If it has it's out of date because both of those buses have been withdrawn in the new timetable.

If you are really stuck call their Customer Support team on 0345 646 0707 (0700-1900 Monday-Friday, 0900-1700 Weekends and bank holidays) but remember you will have to tell them where Ingatestone is.

#### INGATESTONE AND FRYERNING CRICKET CLUB NEWS
