Ingatestone and Fryerning Parish Council lights up High Street for the festive season

Ingatestone and Fryerning Parish Council were pleased to fund the Christmas trees on Ingatestone High Street this year and thank all local businesses who took part in the scheme

The 53 Christmas trees have been mounted along the length of the High Street above the shops and businesses for the last 20 years. Additional funding for the trees came from a previously allocated precept budget of £1,000, originally earmarked for Victorian Evening road closures. In the absence of a Victorian Evening in 2017, IFPC felt that it was important to maintain and improve on this festive tradition.

IFPC paid for the trees to be installed where businesses have existing electric sockets and brackets to position them. The cost included a safety check for each tree. IFPC would also like to thank local firm IDC Greenscapes Ltd for their hard work in installing and checking the trees and Chelmsford – based Spectrum Electrical for undertaking the electrical work.

IFPC chair, Cllr Paul Jeater comments: "High Street Christmas trees are one of the things that make us unique during the festive time of year. This is an important part of our heritage that we don't want to lose. We always receive compliments about the High Street at this time of year and with the cancellation of the Victorian Evening it meant that the trees were even more important"

The parish council are budgeting for the same provision of Christmas trees for 2018.

Village litter pick day

On Saturday 14 October, the parish council held a litter pick day in the village

Over 25 volunteers attended and succeeded in collecting a significant amount of rubbish from Seymour Field all the way through to Tor Bryan. The parish council were able to promote the event with help from Ingatestone and Fryerning C of E (VA) Junior School and ran a competition to design the event poster, displayed by various businesses along the High Street. The best three posters won their designers a £10 Waterstone's voucher each.

The election was contested by three strong candidates and the turnout was 19.79% of the electorate. Nancy won the election with 401 votes which equates to 51.6% of the votes cast.

Nancy will be joining the parish council as its youngest member and was also involved with the Youth Council whilst attending the Anglo-European school. Other ex-pupils of the school sitting on the parish council include Toby Blunsten and Emma Benson.

The Parish Council offers sincere congratulations to one of its members, Peter Davey, who was recently elected chair of the Essex Association of Local Councils, a body that represents town and parish councils across the county.



In addition, Peter has also been elected as chair of the Finance and Scrutiny Committee and now sits on the management board of the National Association of Local Councils.

Peter devotes a large amount of time, working in a voluntary capacity, for these county and national bodies, and Ingatestone and Fryerning benefit enormously from the knowledge and expertise he has acquired.

Road safety at our schools

At November's parish council meeting councillors Kate Sutton and Paul Jeater raised the issue of road safety and the speed of traffic in the areas close to the schools in Ingatestone



Our parish councillors subsequently visited both schools and met with the headteachers and the chair of governors at the Junior School to discuss the situation.

At the Junior School, the main issue surrounded the parking of vehicles close to the corners of the Pemberton Avenue roundabout and the side turnings in the Furlongs. This parking obscures the sightlines for both pedestrians and motorists. One large hedge also has a similar impact.

Some complaints had been received about parents parking and leaving their engines idling for lengthy periods of time especially in the period before school ends for the day, causing an increase in air pollution for residents and pupils.

The high number of cars parked does have the effect of reducing the speed of traffic coming from the direction of the High Street but there remains an issue of cars travelling at inappropriate speeds when travelling down the Furlongs.

The priority at the Infants School is road safety. It is particularly difficult for parents/grandparents taking children to and from the Infants School to cross Fryerning Lane, the crossing is especially difficult given the fact that many parents also have young children in buggies and that infant children do not have a high level of road awareness.

There are also parking issues around the corner of Trimble Close making it difficult for pedestrians walking up Fryerning Lane. The large number of vehicles before and after school mean that many people must cross between cars making it even more precarious.

There was an overwhelming concern about the speed of cars travelling from Fryerning in the

direction of Ingatestone. Cars tend to increase speed as they come down the hill, by the time the school road sign becomes visible cars are virtually at the school gate. There was a unanimous feeling that there needs to be a speed restriction of 20MPH put in place in Fryerning Lane for the time periods before and after school.

The parish council will discuss this issue as a matter of urgency with our Essex County Councillor to see what can be achieved, and we will report back to the schools and to local residents.

Ingatestone and Fryerning Neighbourhood Plan

Our last newsletter featured the intention to compile a Neighbourhood Plan by local residents and the parish council and to explain the purpose of this, namely:

- to set out a framework to guide residents, local authorities and developers on how the community wishes to manage and control future development in the parish over the next 15 years, along with its facilities, services and environment. This document is intended to be updated from time to time, as well as formally every five years.
- to record the historical and existing status and nature of the community and its environment.
- establish an action plan that provides the community with a prioritised plan to improve its facilities, service and environment on a voluntary and assisted basis.



The Neighbourhood Plan therefore will:

- identify the main community issues and objectives for Ingatestone and Fryerning as a whole.
- make proposals for the development and use of land and allocates land for specific purposes.
- set out the community's policies for the management of development.
- provide an Action Plan that schedules a series of desired projects arising from the residents' vision for sustainable growth in the Parish.

Since September 2017 Ingatestone and Fryerning Parish Council has begun the evidence gathering upon which the Neighbourhood Plan will be based.

A Neighbourhood Plan Advisory Committee (NPAC) has been set up, working with a 'project plan' to complete the plan in the Autumn of 2019, to coincide with the Local Development Plan produced by Brentwood Borough Council.

Working Groups are being established and volunteers to join these are encouraged. Our residents have a lot of skills which will be useful to different elements of our plan. We want to make it as easy as possible for residents to engage with the plan, by creating topic based groups as the need arises. This prevents residents from having to make a wider commitment to the whole plan if they are not able, or do not wish to do so.



Our engagement with our community will be through these working groups who will gather evidence via questionnaires, focus groups, meetings with existing local groups, social media and individual interviews. These groups may include primary and secondary school children, young people (18-30), business owners/local businesses, commuters, older residents, people employed in the parish, community groups and societies, families, single parent families, people with physical needs, people with learning needs, residents' associations, homeowners, tenants, faith groups, travellers and gypsies, farmers, landowners and commissioners of services provided for residents.

This initial information gathering phase will take place during the early months of 2018.

So far, some 12 residents have stepped forward to help. We need more. If you have an interest in joining in these discussions or wish to submit an opinion in any other way, please contact the parish office.

An update on Seymour Field and Pavilion

In our recent newsletter our chair, Paul Jeater updated parishioners on current negotiations with Brentwood Borough Council (BBC) to preserve our villages' green and recreational space by acquiring Seymour Field and its pavilion



We believe acquiring a lease on Seymour Field and pavilion will guarantee that it remains a recreational facility. It provides a wonderful opportunity to develop a quality asset that can be enjoyed by the people of Ingatestone and Fryerning for years to come.

Why is the parish council so keen to acquire Seymour Field?

Seymour Field is our only publicly owned recreation field. It is not only the home to all the village's football teams, it is also widely used by dog walkers, youth groups and it is home to the annual Ingatestone and Fryerning Horticultural Society Summer Show.

The village is growing and there is a genuine concern that the field could fall victim to property developers. IFPC is determined to ensure that it should remain a publicly owned recreation area for current residents but also for future generations. The pavilion was built in the 1980's and is in drastic need of refurbishment.

Where we are now?

Draft heads of terms were submitted to BBC in October 2016, which included the requirement of the PC to enter into an agreement for lease. The heads of terms in the form submitted in October 2016 were agreed at a meeting with BBC on the 16 June 2017. Protracted negotiations followed and BBC conceded the need for the PC to enter into such an agreement to protect public funds on the 18 October 2017. An agreement for lease is a crucial tool in a contractual commitment and will mean that the PC can move forward with securing funding

for the refurbishment of the pavilion. However, if this grant is not obtained the parish council will not be taking the lease.

IFPC is currently agreeing the wording of these documents with BBC to protect the field and pavilion whilst ensuring that the best possible value is obtained from public funds.

We have also appointed a project manager to provide IFPC with a works specification. Tenders for the work will be sought in January 2018, which will provide IFPC with a definitive cost of the works required to bring it up to Football Association standards and provide a good quality facility for use by other local community groups. IFPC is hopeful of obtaining matched funding by the Essex Football Association (EFA) and, in addition, further grants will be sought towards the cost of the works and the future running of the pavilion.

We cannot guarantee these funds and, therefore we must budget on the assumption that we will need to self-fund the pavilion refurbishment as well as the upkeep of the field. We also need to budget to improve security measures to ensure that the field can be enjoyed by local residents throughout the year. Therefore, to facilitate the necessary work IFPC will reduce its reserves for the financial year 2018-19.

When the project goes ahead, a project manager will be selected to oversee the build. However, if for some unforeseen reason it was not to proceed, IFPC has not yet contractually committed itself to this expense.

Fryerning Cemetery bench scheme



In the last year the Churchyards and Environment Committee has started a memorial bench scheme at Fryerning Cemetery. Parishioners now have the opportunity to sponsor a bench in memory of a loved one, providing a spot for visitors to sit peacefully and reflect in a beautiful rural setting.

The first bench has already been ordered and will be installed within the next month.

In order to maintain the general aesthetic of the cemetery the committee has identified appropriate bench locations and designs and they can be ordered through the parish clerk. The committee has opted for two benches, one in teak and one in oak in order to provide options for a range of budgets. These benches can be personalised with either a plaque or engraving. If this scheme is of interest please contact the parish council office for further information.

In the next financial year, the Churchyards and Environments Committee have requested budgets to replace the wicker fencing around the skip to camouflage the area and are also looking into the creation of a green burial site within the cemetery extension that follows strict guidelines to allow nature to flourish in a more informal burial setting. Plans for this site are in the initial stages and the committee will provide further details of this burial option in the future.

Ingatestone Garden Centre development

A planning application has now been submitted to Brentwood Borough Council by Redrow Homes, to redevelop the former garden centre site for up to 110 residential dwellings



The application has been submitted in outline form, meaning that details such as the precise layout of the units and their design are not for determination at this stage. The applicant has however submitted an indicative site layout plan, showing how the site could potentially be developed to achieve the 110 units.

Whilst not falling within the parish of Ingatestone and

Fryerning, there may be impacts on our village particularly in terms of GP surgery, schools and parking.

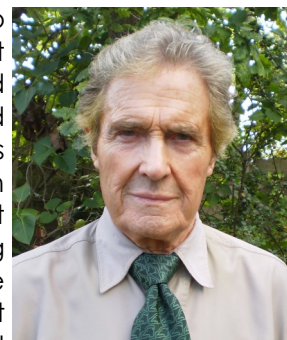
The plans and supporting documents are all available to view on Brentwood Borough Council's website in the 'Planning and Building Control' section. The reference number for the application is 17/01815/OUT. Public consultation runs until 22 January and comments can be made to the Borough Council either via their webpage or by letter.

351 Bus Service

How have you 351 buses users been finding the service? I hope that, like me, you have found it reasonably good, and noticed that there is even the occasional newer (note 'newer' not 'new'!) bus

One problem I had reported to me was a bus not stopping at the Chelmsford Marks and Spencer stop. The 351 had stopped behind another bus and when this bus moved on the 351 followed it and did not pick up the waiting passengers. I can only assume that the driver thought that those wanting his bus would



have got on whilst he was waiting. Although this was not particularly clever of the driver in question, it does serve as a reminder that we must always signal the bus to stop. The last couple of times that I have caught the 351 at the Marks and Spencer stop I have stepped out, albeit to the surprise of those in the queue, and put my hand out as the 351 approaches after the bus in front has left. Having returned to Chelmsford bus station just before 5pm from Stansted airport on the X10 service I realised that there are no 351 buses to Brentwood around this time; therefore, we have a one hour wait after the 4.30 pm departure. I will be taking this up at my next meeting with First Buses, as this long gap is unacceptable at that time of day. Please let me know if you are aware of any other shortcomings in the bus timetable.

Although a train and not bus matter, I repeat the information that I gave a few newsletters ago that Tesco vouchers can be used to buy senior citizen railcards for half price.

I wish all public transport travellers and all readers stress-free travelling.

Essex County Council consultations – get involved



Did you know that Essex County Council regularly hold consultations on issues which affect our parish?

You can have your say if you know how. The responses to these consultations directly influence how the County Council prioritise spending and write policy.

For example, ECC are currently reviewing their library services. Mobile libraries currently service lots of areas in Essex which do not have easy access to a library. However, the service is erratic, and lots of stops get no visitors. Therefore, ECC have reviewed the policy, and decided that reducing the number of stops could help Essex Libraries to provide a more useful and accessible service.

Following this review of the policy, in September, ECC held a consultation about this and asked Essex residents their views on the current service, and the proposals for future changes.

This consultation has now closed, but it is just one of several consultations which ECC regularly hold about different areas of policy. Essex County Council currently have lots of consultations live, including surveys about hate crime, and children's social care.

It is really important that as many residents as possible have their say whenever they can. These consultations shape policy, and change the places in which we live.

New Musical Director for Ingatestone Choral Society (ICS)

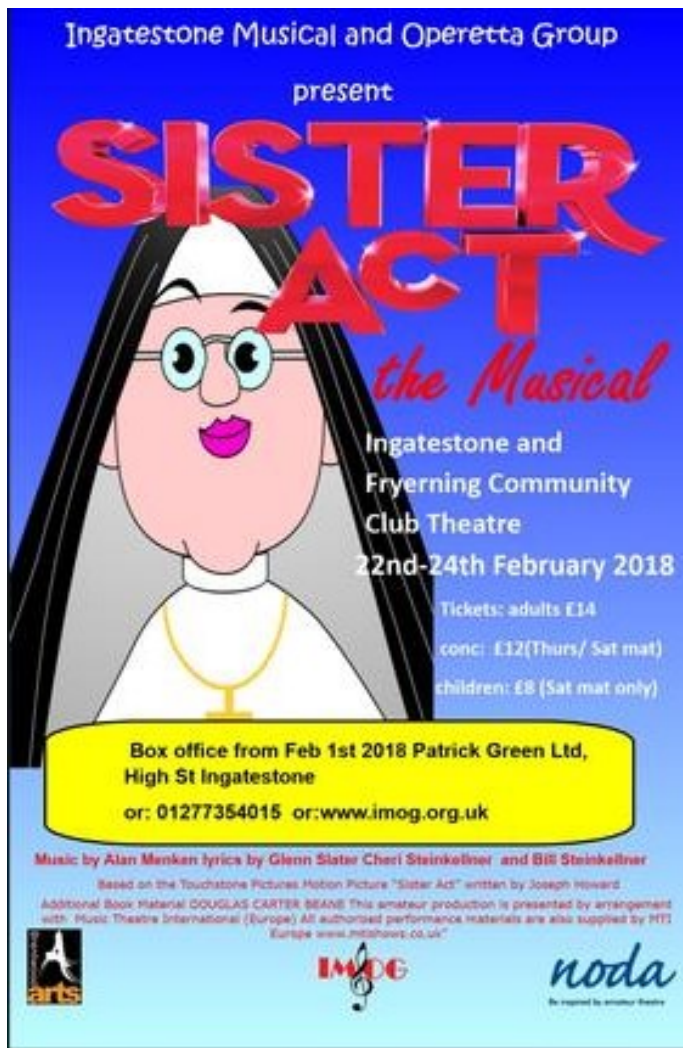

Essex County Fire and Rescue Service is urging everyone in the County to make sure they have working smoke alarms in their home

According to national statistics 88% of homes have a smoke alarm but that means that there are 93,000

households in Essex which are at risk because they don't have working smoke alarm.

The service wants to ensure that every single home in the county has the excellent protection smoke alarms offer and will come to any home in Essex and fit smoke alarms free of charge.

All it takes is one phone call, or five minutes to fill in a simple online form, and officers will visit your home and give you all the help and advice you need as well as fitting smoke alarms to protect you and your family.

Divisional officer Neil Fenwick says: "Just three breaths of smoke can be enough to kill if a fire breaks out when you're sleeping.

"Smoke alarms are proven life savers. They give warning at the first sign of fire, waking you and your family up and giving everyone the time they need to get safely out and call the fire service.

"Although the majority of homes in the county have working smoke alarms we want to make sure that every home has the excellent protection they offer. We will visit your home, carry out a safety inspection, give you all the advice you need and fit smoke alarms entirely free of charge."

Extra crews to tackle potholes

Extra repair crews will hit the road tackling potholes with extra funding from the government

Residents are set to see six additional Essex Highways crews on the ground in January helping to improve the condition of our county's road.

Essex Highways completed more than three million square metres of road surfacing this summer to help

reduce the number of potholes developing on key routes.

As well as crews dedicated to fixing potholes, other crews carry

out: resurfacing, streetlight repairs and replacement, safety improvements, emergency repairs, traffic light upgrades, white line repainting, drain clearance, pavement and kerb repairs, inspections, bridge repair, as well as seasonal verge cutting and footpath maintenance.

If you are thinking about returning to work after being unemployed for longer than 12 months and feel like you need some support then an Essex based project could be just what you need



HeadsUp is a free programme funded by the Big Lottery Fund and European Social Fund. It is designed to help people who have a common mental health problem such as anxiety or depression find and maintain work after a period of long-term unemployment.

People wishing to take part will be matched with a peer support worker, someone who has been in a similar situation and has returned to work.

As well as the practical stuff, the programme also places a great deal of emphasis on exploring and dealing with the emotional barriers that could be standing in the way of you returning to work.

Through a series of interactive workshops, you'll identify these barriers and find ways to boost your self-confidence, take charge of your well-being and learn tricks to increase your personal resilience.

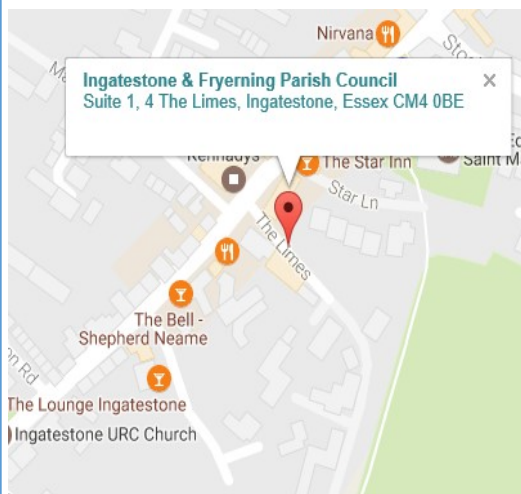
