– LETTER FROM THE CHAIR



There was no need for an election to the Parish Council on May 4th. The council has room for 15 members, and this year 12 residents were duly nominated, and therefore they were automatically elected. This means, of course, that there are three vacancies and we will begin the process of co-opting those additional members in the coming weeks. More details regarding this can be found elsewhere in this newsletter.

I was delighted and honoured to be re-elected as Chair of the Parish Council at its Annual Meeting in May. There is much work to be undertaken on existing projects but it is also vitally important that we learn from residents their priorities

and opinions of how the villages of Ingatestone and Fryerning should develop over the next four years.

To this end, in the centre pages of this edition, you will find a questionnaire. I would encourage you to complete and return it. If your household has more than one person living within it, and another person would like to express their views, the survey will also be available online via our website.

Having adopted our Neighbourhood Plan in 2022, we are beginning the task of ensuring that it is implemented. The committee are focusing on certain priority areas including safer routes for pedestrians and cyclists through the parish.


In the last newsletter I highlighted the issues we face with Seymour Field, but since then we had the wonderful news that the Football Foundation has awarded us a grant totalling £34,000 spread over 6 years for us to start a programme of pitch improvements.

Finally, thank you for the positive feedback that we received about the last newsletter and monthly enewsletter. Hope you all have a great summer.

Did You Know?

According to the 2021 Census, the highest population growth has been recorded in the East of England (8.3% increase since 2011).

In Ingatestone and Fryerning, population has slightly increased since 2011, particularly in the 65+ age group. The percentage of residents over 65 has now reached 24.4%, which is almost 6% higher than the national average of 18.6%!

Speed Watch Coming to Ingatestone, Fryerning and Mountnessing

In response to many appeals from residents to tackle speeding through the villages, a Community Speed Watch group is being established.

What is CSW? The Community Speed Watch initiative allows members of the community to address speeding issues by becoming actively involved in road safety, using speed detection equipment to monitor speeds from safe locations.

Whilst all of the road safety partners are working together to achieve casualty reduction targets and reduce the number of people killed and seriously injured on our roads we cannot expect police officers to carry out enforcement checks in every community on a regular basis. This is where Community Speed Watch can help by working with the partnership.

The partnership aim is NOT to catch as many speeding drivers as possible but to raise awareness that excessive speeds are socially unacceptable. We aim to reduce speed in areas of concern and address issues from communities by raising awareness,

Every CSW location for monitoring will have been chosen by the Community. Each site will then be risk assessed, which will include the safe positioning for the signs used during monitoring.

The data collected by the CSW informs the partners in the Safer Essex Roads Partnership who contact offenders and decide on other measures to improve safety.

Locally we called for volunteers to start a group, and some residents have stepped forward and undergone the training. A minimum of three people will go out at any one time on an agreed programme of monitoring. Any time you can give is valuable.

Climate Emergency Working Group

The re-wilding of the closed churchyard at St Edmund and St Mary's is nearing completion.

Funding from the Brentwood Community Fund and the Parish Council has brought together local residents and young people to provide a space for teenage girls and for people living with dementia in particular to meet. The Anglo European School Gardening Club drew up the plan and the Primary School has worked with it to produce bug hotels, bat and bird boxes to be installed before the **official opening on 15th June**.



Already the large hexagonal table, with wheelchair/pushchair access is in daily use with people chatting and eating their lunch or drinking a coffee from the High Street, and there is a large bench in an area that catches the sun for contemplation. A further bench with arms and height suitable for people who are not so agile is on order.





Economic Development Working Group: Gigabit Broadband Update

The EDWG have been working with Digital Essex and government agency Building Digital UK (BDUK) to encourage the roll out of gigabit broadband in our parish.

Most homes already have so-called superfast broadband which is fast enough for viewing Ultra High Definition programmes on iPlayer, internet shopping, downloading films etc. It's delivered by an optical fibre to a cabinet in the street, then a copper wire to your home. That's OK for many people at the moment, but those in multi-user households or working from home increasingly find it too slow. And it won't be sufficient for many services in the future.

The solution is so called gigabit broadband, also called ultrafast or full fibre broadband. A gigabit per second is 1000 Mb/s so well over ten times the speed you have now. That is usually achieved by replacing the copper wire to your home with an optical fibre.

Around 70% of homes in Essex already have access to gigabit broadband, but less than 10% do in Ingatestone & Fryerning!

The Government have a programme, "Project Gigabit" run by BDUK, to subsidise gigabit broadband connection to those properties that are unattractive to infrastructure/service providers on a purely commercial basis. Initially our parish wasn't included, but following EDWG lobbying, is now "under review". Watch this space for updates - the wheels of government grind slowly so we're not expecting a decision until 2024.

1. Housing

Brentwood Borough Council, as the Local Planning Authority, is required to have a Local Development Plan – a key component is to formulate plans to build approximately 456 dwellings a year across the Borough. This figure is arrived at using population and household projections.

> Planning permission was granted in 2021-22 for CALA Homes to construct 57 dwellings on what was green belt land next to the A12, starting in 2023.

> The Redrow development of 110 dwellings on the former Ingatestone Garden Centre is under construction.

> Planning permission has been granted for Hallmark Care to build a 70-bed care home, offices and a training centre near these two housing developments.

> The Parish Council produced a Neighbourhood Plan in 2022 which must be taken into account when Brentwood planners agree further developments enabling us to consult with the community and influence the design of any scheme, including the types and mix of affordable housing.

> In the future, it is likely that Brentwood will be identifying further suitable sites for more development, around Ingatestone, and we need to have your views on this.

We initiated major improvements to the pavilion and are about to start substantial pitch improvements. Fairfield Recreation Ground and the Stock Lane Allotment site are leased by the Parish Council from the Lord Petre estate. Ingatestone & Fryerning Cricket Club have a license enabling them to be primary users of Fairfield between April and September. The Parish has many footpaths, bridleways and public open space enabling residents to enjoy the countryside. Brentwood is responsible for amenity greens.

IFPC Celebrate Grass Pitch Funding Success

The Parish Council has long recognised that the main full-size adult football pitch has been overplayed as have some of the youth pitches at Seymour Field. After discussions with Essex County Football Association, we were encouraged to undertake a pitch analysis that involved looking at aspects such as grass coverage, root strength and sub soil structure. The end result was that the Football Foundation have offered to assist the Parish Council by offering substantial grant aid to improve the pitches on the field.



IFPC was awarded a grant of £34,134 from the Premier League, The FA and Government's Football Foundation, for the improvement of the football pitches on Seymour Field.

The Football Foundation is the UK's largest sports charity and exists to improve the experience of playing football for everyone, by championing fair access to quality facilities. The investment was provided following the completion of a pitch inspection using PitchPower – the Football Foundation's specially developed web app used for assessing the quality of grass football pitches. IFPC will now be able to use the grant to complete the maintenance work identified in our PitchPower Assessment Report, which includes applying fertiliser, aeration, seeding and other maintenance practices.

These grants are key to the Foundation's aim to deliver 20,000 'good' quality grass pitches by 2030. Alongside PitchPower, the Football Foundation has also created an online Groundskeeping Community to provide expert support and advice to clubs. Robert Sullivan, Chief Executive of the Football Foundation, said: "This Grass Pitch Maintenance Fund grant award to IFPC is vital for the local community in Ingatestone. Together, with our Funding Partners – The Premier League, The FA and Government – we're on a mission to transform the quality of grass pitches in England. Our Grass Pitch Maintenance Fund is vital to support clubs across the country, helping them enhance and sustain their pitches to improve access to good quality facilities for grassroots players."

The Grass Pitch Maintenance Fund provides eligible clubs and leagues with a tapered six-year grant to help them sustain pitches already at a 'good' level or higher and enhance pitches that are either considered 'poor' or 'basic'.



The grant is tapered with the majority of funding coming in the first two years; the assumption being that as the quality of pitches improves, less work will need to be undertaken.

As a result of this investment, the Parish Council will approach Brentwood Council with the intention of securing an extension of the lease which at present has just over 20 years to run.

Brentwood Art Trail Comes to Ingatestone




